As of 2024, SPFR is one of only 312 accredited departments worldwide and among the elite 123 that have earned an ISO-Class 1 rating.



# **DISASTER EMERGENCY RESPONSE**

Throughout 2024, the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was activated multiple times, including full activations for **Hurricanes Helene** and **Milton** and partial activations for **Hurricane Debby**, as well as during severe weather and flooding events. The **Urban Search and Rescue (USAR)** Team played a critical role, with eight Task Forces comprising **486 personnel** assessing **over 56,304 structures** in just six days.

In addition to hurricane response, crews managed over **50 hazardous incidents**, including gas leaks, chemical and oil spills, orphaned containers, and lithium-ion battery hazards. Teams also conducted **more than 150 rescues and emergency evacuations** from flooded areas and provided vital assistance during a **four-day deployment** to North Central Florida and South Manatee County.

These efforts reflect the department's commitment to swift, coordinated emergency response, safeguarding communities in times of crisis.

# **IMPACT REPORT**

In 2024, St. Petersburg Fire Rescue welcomed **two** new recruit classes, adding **17** uniformed members to its ranks, including:

- 5 Firefighter/Paramedics
- 11 Firefighter/Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs)
- 1 Paramedic



As part of the department's fleet replacement plan, **4 apparatus** were retired and replaced with clean-cab certified vehicles, enhancing firefighter safety by reducing exposure to harmful carcinogens, including:

- Engine 4
- Engine 8
- Engine 12
- Reserve Ladder Truck, Station 13



In 2024, SPFR received the **Gold Standard** award from the **American Heart Association** for providing top-quality emergency care to heart attack patients before they reach the hospital.

The department was honored by a visit from **Dr. Lori Moore-Merrell, U.S. Fire Administrator,** recognizing its dedication and hard work during the response and recovery efforts for Hurricanes Helene and Milton.

The **U.S. Secret Service** recognized the department for its exceptional support, coordination, and medical coverage during the President of the United States' recent visit to the city of St. Petersburg.



#### **PUBLIC EDUCATION PROGRAMS**

- Conducted **379** educational sessions, reaching **73,807** residents.
- Visited **35** schools, impacting **3,000**+ children during the annual Great American Teach-In.

#### **WATER SAFETY INITIATIVES**

- Distributed **525** life jackets and funded **113** free swim lessons.
- Raised over **\$1,300** for water safety programs throughout the community.





#### **CPR CLASSES**

• Taught **247** classes to **2,005** local participants, including **328** city employees.

#### **JWB PARTNERSHIP**

 Provided more than 200 free CPR class vouchers, with 58 vouchers utilized through the Juvenile Welfare Board (JWB) partnership.

# **HOME SAFE PROGRAM**

• Visited **133** homes, installing **258** smoke and door alarms to improve residential safety.

# **LEADERSHIP AND DIVERSITY**

- Camp Ignite, the department's first-ever all-girls fire rescue camp, provided 12 teens with hands-on fire and EMS training, CPR certification, and leadership development in partnership with the Pinellas County Urban League's 'EmpowHer' initiative.
- SPFR launched the city's first **Inclusivity Committee** to promote equity, diversity, and a culture of respect and belonging.
- Lindsay Judah became the first female Chief on Senior Staff, and Keith Watts was appointed as the department's first Black Fire Rescue Chief.

# **ENSURING LIFE SAFETY**

- Conducted 14,000+ commercial and residential property inspections.
- Reviewed 2,876 building plans and completed 2,996 new construction inspections.
- Performed 344 licensure inspections.

# **BRINGING THE COMMUNITY TOGETHER**

- Haunted Firehouse attracted 3,000 visitors, raising \$14,000 for holiday programs.
- Shop with a Firefighter and Toy Drive supported **35** children during the holidays, and provided toy donations for nearly **450** children.
- Provided EMS coverage at **262** special events and distributed **40 doses** of Narcan through its Leave Behind Narcan program.
- Provided **\$7,200** in assistance to **11** fire-affected families, supporting **22** adults and **20** children with food, clothing, and childcare supplies.

#### PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE

**High-Water Vehicles:** To better serve the city of St. Petersburg during severe weather and flooding events, the department is adding **three high-water vehicles** to its fleet in 2025.

**Fire Station 2:** Currently in the **design phase**, the new Fire Station 2 will enhance emergency response, expand coverage, and provide a modern facility to better serve the surrounding community and personnel.

**Training Facility:** A new training facility is in the **design phase** at the department's drill grounds, ensuring firefighters have access to advanced resources and hands-on training to strengthen emergency preparedness.
